The CATS team will be returning to schools during terms 2 and 3 with our iPads and measuring stations! We will be asking the children to complete a questionnaire and have their measurements taken. The scientists in our laboratory are having a rest this year so no saliva samples will be taken in 2013. Parents will be asked to complete a follow-up questionnaire, which will be much shorter than the first one. Your child's new teacher will also be asked to fill in a questionnaire.

RESULTS SNEAK PEEK



The CATS team are very excited to be returning in 2013, but before we do, here is a sneak peek at what the data from 2012 are showing so far...

The children were aged between 8 and 11 years, the average age was 8.5 years old	English is the most common language spoken at home (85%)	11% of parents reported their child has a food allergy
There are slightly more girls (54%) than boys (46%) in the study	12% of children were born overseas, with at least one child from each continent (except Antarctica!)	64% of children play a team sport and 74% play an individual sport
One set of triplets, 24 sets of twins and 2 pairs of siblings are taking part in CATS	91% of children said their health was either good, very good or excellent	55% of children see their friends outside of school every week



MEET THE STUDY DIRECTOR

Professor George Patton



George Patton is the Professor of Adolescent Health Research at the University of Melbourne and Royal Children's Hospital. He has advised the World Health Organisation, UNICEF and the United Nations on child and adolescent health. George answers some questions about himself and why CATS is so important.

What made you set up the CATS study?

After birth there is no more exciting and life changing experience than the journey from childhood to the teenage years. How a child and his/her family manage the great physical and emotional changes through puberty has a great bearing on how a child goes on to cope with the exciting and challenging adolescent years.

Why is CATS such an important study?

There is no other study anywhere in the world like CATS. Earlier studies of child development have skipped over these years so we know little about the different ways in which children and their families experience all the changes that happen in these years between primary and secondary school.

What do you like to do in your spare time?

I get to travel overseas a lot and love visiting new places. I also like doing things like going on a long bike ride, swimming at the beach or just reading a good book.
